Online Programming

Christopher Udemezue walks us through his work drawing on his Jamaican heritage and with a focus on the nuanced relationship of Queer identity, gender and race as complicated by the legacies of colonialism in the Caribbean. With references ranging from Tapatapa Dancehall music to Jacques-Louis David's painting *The Death of Murat*, Udemezue's practice of storytelling pay homage to, lift up, and build communities of Queer Caribbean people.
